TOMORROW WILL STILL BE OURS is a three-week festival that gathers a diverse array of activists, artists, and thinkers to help shape our collective response to a changing America. Together we will examine the world as it is, imagine the world as we want it to be, and work to advance that vision.

The festival, curated by Brian Tate, will present free public forums on three distinct movements with rich histories of social change: Black Activism (February 8th), Religious Activism, (February 15th) and Environmental Activism (February 22nd). Now, in the nation's new political landscape, those movements are themselves on rapidly shifting ground. How will they respond? Through panel discussions with leaders and innovators in each area, TOMORROW WILL STILL BE OURS will place those movements in political and cultural context, and outline a future when their progressive values are again ascendant.

The festival's cultural programming includes performances by some of the most original artists in New York City. Some will perform brief sets at the weekly panel discussions, while others will appear at the Festival Wrap Party: Say It Loud (February 24th).

GBE has organized an exhibition to serve as a visual framework and backdrop to these discussions. Funds from this show will benefit the ACLU, an organization at the front line in the fight for our rights and freedoms. In the ACLU's own words: "We are not an America that tries to forcibly remove 11 million undocumented immigrants, bans the entry of Muslims into our country and aggressively surveils them, or limits the rights of women to access abortion services. We won't go back - not on torture, not on freedom of expression, not on reproductive rights, and not on police accountability. We've been defending your rights for nearly 100 years, no matter who is in the White House. Now more than ever, we need you with us."
