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ULRICH MUSEUM OF ART PRESENTS POETS ON PAINTERS

WICHITA, KAN. — From April 22 to August 5, 2007, the Ulrich Museum of Art will present the exhibition *Poets on Painters*. This visual and literary exhibition pairs 20 contemporary poets with 20 contemporary paintings. Each poet's response to a painting will be displayed alongside the artwork. A sampling of today's written and visual arts, *Poets on Painters* focuses on the intrinsic and fascinating connections between two of the oldest art forms as seen by some of their newest practitioners.

Poets on Painters recalls 20th-century collaborations between Apollinaire and Duchamp, Stein and Picasso, and O'Hara and Rivers in its playful examination of how poetry and painting converge and diverge in the 21st century. The internationally recognized visual and literary artists included in the exhibition represent a vast array of styles and approaches, both traditional and experimental.

A timely survey of contemporary painting and poetry, the exhibition instigates collaboration between established and emerging artists. The exhibition is a cross section of contemporary painting, a sampling that reflects a deeper understanding on the state of this artistic medium today. The project includes such notables as painters Mark Grotjahn, Laura Owens, Monique Prieto and Dana Schutz, and poets Jeff Clark, Noah Eli Gordon and Sawako Nakayasu.

The exhibition is curated by Katie Geha, curator of modern and contemporary art at the Ulrich Museum of Art, and Travis Nichols, a freelance writer based in Seattle.

Poets on Painters will be accompanied by a full-color catalogue designed by Jeff Clark with essays by co-curators Katie Geha and Travis Nichols, and an introduction by distinguished poet Anselm Berrigan. The poet's response to a painting appears alongside each image, creating a dynamic catalogue that is equal parts painting and poetry. A complete checklist and biographical information on each artist and poet will be included.

Poets on Painters is organized by the Ulrich Museum of Art and goes on national tour through 2008. It will travel to the following venues after its Wichita premiere: University Galleries at Illinois State

University, November 6-December 16, 2007; Queens Library Gallery in Jamaica, N.Y., February 4-March 30, 2008, and Sheldon Memorial Gallery at the University of Nebraska in Lincoln, April 26-June 29, 2008. The exhibition and accompanying catalogue are generously supported by Commerce Bank, the William T. Kemper Foundation, Harry Pollack, and Keith and Georgia Stevens.

About the Artists in the Exhibition

Mequitta Ahuja was born in 1976 in Grand Rapids, Michigan, and lives and works in Houston. She studied at the University of Illinois at Chicago and received her MFA in 2004. Exhibitions include *Dancing in the Hide of Shere Khan* at the Museum of Contemporary Art in Chicago; *d'Afrique d'Asie*, Jeff Baysa, New York; and Global Feminisms at the Elizabeth A. Sackler Center for Feminist Art at the Brooklyn Museum of Art. She is attending the Core residency program in Houston.

Abel Auer was born in 1974 in Munich. He has had works shown in exhibitions at Corvi-Mora, London; Gabriele Senne Galerie, Vienna; Galerie Hansaplatz, Hamburg; and Tanya Bonakdar Gallery, New York. He was also included in Art Basel Miami Beach 2006. He lives and works in Hamburg.

Jules de Balincourt was born in 1972 in Paris. He has held solo exhibitions at Zach Feuer Gallery, New York; d'Art Moderne de la Ville de Paris, Paris; and the Arndt and Partner, Berlin. Group exhibitions include: *Notre histoire...*, Palais de Tokyo, Paris: *Greater New York*, PS1/MOMA, Queens; *Metro Pictures*, The Moore Space, Miami; and The Wrong Gallery at the Whitney Biennial, Whitney Museum of American Art, New York. About the Poets in the Exhibition

Eric Baus was born in Fort Wayne, Indiana, in 1979. Baus's book, *The To Sound*, was selected by Forrest Gander for the 2002 Verse Press Prize and was awarded a grant from the Greenwall Fund of the Academy of American Poets. He is the author of three chapbooks: *The Space Between Magnets*, *A Swarm In The Aperture*, and *Something Else The Music Was*. His poems have appeared in Hambone, Verse, Colorado Review, Conjunctions, and other journals.

Jeff Clark was born in Fullerton, California, in 1971. Clark attended UC Davis on a football scholarship, drummed there in the noise duo Buick and pursued studies in art and English. He went to Iowa to study poetry, after which he moved back to San Francisco. His first book, *The Little Door Slides Back*, was published by Sun and Moon in 1997. His second book, *Music and Suicide*, was published by Farrar Straus Giroux in 2004, who also reprinted *The Little Door* the same year. For nearly a decade he has made his living as a book designer. His studio, Quemadura, produces books and posters, as well as art and objects.

Corina Copp was born in Lawrence, Kansas, in 1979. Copp is the author of *Play Air* (Belladonna* Books, 2005), and the e-book, *Carpeted* (Faux Press, 2004). Her poems and reviews have appeared in or are forthcoming from Fence, The Germ, The Poetry Project Newsletter, Pom2, and Magazine Cypress. She lives in Brooklyn, New York.

Monica Fambrough was born in Mableton, Georgia, in 1979. Fambrough received her BA from the University of Georgia and her MFA from the University of Massachusetts-Amherst. Paul Killebrew was born in Nashville in 1978. Killebrew is the author of *Forget Rita* (Poetry Society of America, 2003) and *Inspector vs. Evader* (Ugly Duckling Press, 2006). He is finishing a law degree in New York City.

Dorothea Lasky was born in St. Louis in 1978. Lasky lives in Boston where she edits the Katalanche Press chapbook series, with the poet Michael Carr. Her poems have appeared in CROWD, 6x6, Boston Review, and Carve, among others. Her chapbook, *Alphabets and Portraits*, was published in 2004 by Anchorite Press and her chapbook, *The Hatmaker's Wife*, is forthcoming from Braincase Press. Nick Moudry was born in Waterloo, Iowa, in 1978. Moudry's recent works include the chapbook *High noon* (Indivia, 2005) and a translation of Tristan Tzara's *Twenty-Five and One Poems* (Toad Press, 2004). In 2003, he was a fellow at the Atlantic Center for the Arts. His work has appeared in numerous journals, including Denver Quarterly, Fence, and The Hat. He lives in Philadelphia.

Sawako Nakayasu was born in Yokohama, Japan, in 1975. Nakayasu's books include *Nothing fictional but the accuracy or arrangement (she*, (Quale Press) and *So we have been given time Or*, (Verse Press, 2004), and *Clutch* (Tinfish chapbook, 2002). She edits the journal *Factorial*, as well as the Translation section for HOW2, and in 2003 received the US-Japan Creative Artists' Program Fellowship from the National Endowment for the Arts. Since then she has been translating contemporary Japanese poetry into English, and is also at work creating an online database of Japanese poetry in translation. She is the recipient of a 2006 Witter Bynner Foundation poetry translator residency at the Santa Fe Art Institute and a 2006 PEN Translation Fund Grant for translations of Chika Sagawa and Takashi Hiraide, respectively. Her own writing has been translated into Japanese and Swedish.

Hoa Nguyen was born near Saigon in 1967. Nguyen lives in Austin, Texas, where she teaches creative writing. She co-edits the magazine Skanky Possum (available from Small Press Distribution) with Dale Smith. Her work has appeared in various journals and in *An Anthology of New (American) Poets* (Talisman House, 1998). She is the author of *Parrot Drum* (Leroy, 2000), *Your ancient see through* (Subpress, 2002) and *Red Juice* (Effing, 2005).

John Olson was born in Minneapolis in 1945. Olson is the author of five books of prose poetry, including *The Night I Dropped Shakespeare on the Cat, Oxbow Kazoo, Free Stream Velocity, Logo Lagoon,* and *Eggs & Mirrors.* His works (essays, poetry, short stories and literary criticism) have appeared in numerous publications, including New American Writing, First Intensity, Sulfur, Rain Taxi, the American Book Review, Exquisite Corpse, 5 Trope, Titanic Operas, Dusie, and Bewildering Stories.

Kristin Prevallet was born in Denver in 1975. Prevallet's third book, *SHADOW EVIDENCE INTELLIGENCE*, was published by Factory School in 2006. Recent works have appeared in Barrow Street, Fence, Damn the Caesars, and An Apparent Event: A Second Story Books Anthology. She is cofounder of Study Abroad on the Bowery: A Program in Applied Poetics at the Bowery Poetry Club. Along with Jerrold Shiroma she is the editor of MaterialWord.com, a site of word/image studies.

Laura Solomon was born in LaGrange, Georgia, in 1975. Solomon is the author of *Bivouac* (Slope Editions, 2002) and *Blue and Red Things* (Ugly Duckling Presse, 2007). She has worked as an editor for the journals Verse and castagraf and has published widely, most recently in 6X6, How2, Xconnect and Coconut. She is a graduate of the MFA program for poets and writers at University of Massachusetts-Amherst and currently lives in Philadelphia.

Sara Veglahn was born in La Crosse, Wisconsin, in 1973. Veglahn's recent work has appeared in Conjunctions, Fence, POM2, 580 Split, and elsewhere. She is the author of two chapbooks: *Another Random Heart* (Margin to Margin, 2002) and *Falling Forward* (Braincase Press, 2003), and is co-author of the chapbook *That We Come to a Consensus* (Ugly Duckling Presse, 2006), a collaboration with Noah Eli Gordon. She received her MFA in poetry from the University of Massachusetts-Amherst, and is pursuing a P.h.D. in creative writing with a genre focus of fiction at the University of Denver.

Kary Wayson was born in Hanover, New Hampshire in 1970 and was raised in Portland, Oregon. Wayson's poems have appeared in Poetry Northwest, The Nation, and FIELD, among others. Her chapbook, *Dog & Me*, was published in 2004 by LitRag Press. A 2004 and 2005 Pushcart Prize nominee, she teaches poetry writing classes for The Richard Hugo House in Seattle, Washington.

Joshua Marie Wilkinson was born in Seattle in 1977. Wilkinson's books include *Suspension of a Secret in Abandoned Rooms*—a long poem in conversation with the life and work of Egon Schiele—and *Lug Your Careless Body out of the Careful Dusk*, a new book-length poem that draws on the works of Susan Rothenberg, Francis Bacon, Lucian Freud, and Fassbinder. He is completing his first feature-length documentary about the band Califone titled *Made a Machine by Describing the Landscape*, which is due out in 2007. He earned degrees in poetry and film from the University of Arizona and the University College Dublin, respectively. He is completing a PhD at University of Denver where he is at work on a new collection of poems.

The Edwin A. Ulrich Museum of Art at Wichita State University serves as the area's premier venue for modern and contemporary art, and for new work by emerging and established artists of national and international reputation. With an active acquisition program stressing recent work by a group of younger artists, the collection includes outstanding examples of contemporary works. Located on the campus of Wichita State University, and home to the world-renowned Martin H. Bush Outdoor Sculpture Collection, the museum is open 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday-Friday, and 1 to 5 p.m. Saturday and Sunday. Admission is always free, and guided group tours are available.
